What is the Big Picture and Who Benefits Parents, Children, Church

- Families are able to go to church together

- Leaders are blessed by serving in special needs



Getting Leadership on Board with the Ministry

- Estimated 90% of special needs families don't attend church

- One in five families in the us have at least one member with a disability

- 1:59 children diagnosed with autism



Recruiting and Training Volunteers on Policies/Procedures

- Look for people with experience in special education, health care, or have family members with disabilities

 Have policies in writing – as with any children, <u>never</u> leave any child alone with only one buddy

- Training on behavior



Creating a Profile for Each Child

- Emergency number where someone can be contacted

- Likes/dislikes/calming techniques

- Allergy information



Create a Welcoming Room

- Sensory friendly classroom set up

- Hands on curriculum adaptation

- Soft lighting

- Picture schedules



Providing in Class Support Buddies

- Friendship/discipleship

- Ability to participate
- Positive reinforcement





Sensory Boxes

- Sound reducing headphones

- Fabric with varying textures

- Weighted blankets/toys



- Stress balls

Partner with Parents

- Invite the parent to bring the child at a time when it is quiet so the child can learn the room and feel comfortable

- Get parents permission to speak to their teacher at school so you can be consistent on making it successful for the child



How Do You Get the Word Out?

 Respite – For special needs children and siblings to allow for parents to have a much needed break

Parent support groups – provide discussion topics/speakers
